# Former Addiscombe Station Site Building Development

We arranged a meeting on 7 August that encompassed some six other affected residents associations. This was a unique opportunity to meet with the developers, Councillors and planning officer and for residents to have their say. We're pleased to report that Bellway Homes have encompassed in their final plans all those points that were made to them.

Our particular sticking point was the resiting of the Lower Addiscombe Road zebra crossing by the Post Office and the adjacent bus stops. The final plans showed the zebra crossing moved to the parade of shops between Sodha Wines and the Post Office. This would have meant that no one could have pulled up in a car outside the shops who depend on this passing trade. We proposed that the crossing be moved minimally to outside Addiscombe Carriage Company and that the north side Lower Addiscombe Road bus stop slip just a little way towards The Alma. At a major meeting at the Town Hall on Thursday 6 December full planning permission was granted and the crossing will indeed be outside the Addiscombe Carriage Company.

We will continue to monitor and report on the construction as it happens. It has already been pointed out by a local expert in the building trade that copious amounts of mud are being tracked onto Lower Addiscombe Road by the Contractor's lorries from the site. We are urging Bellway to get them to put in a wheel wash facility within the site boundary with a hardcore base from there to the gates thus preventing the ingress of mud onto the public footpath and road.

#### The New Addiscombe Linear Park

And now we turn to greener matters – part of the Bellway deal with Croydon Council was that they would contribute the land from Black Horse Bridge down to about half the length of the site as a linear park. There have been lengthy endeavours by Croydon Council to get together a meeting of people interested in contributing their ideas about the park. This has not happened yet but, if you would like to register your interest, become a friend of the park and have some guidance in its planning and development, then we suggest you contact Finn Raven, Community Partnership Officer, (Nature Conservation), directly.
