Badgers Seen in our Roads!



There have been reports of badgers in our roads!

Their hair is black and white leading to a grey appearance from a distance. It has a prominent black and white striped head with white tipped ears. They grow up to 30 inches (750 mm) from head to tail with a six inch (150m) tail and usually weigh between eight and 12 kilos.

The badger has the distinction of being the largest land carnivore left in the British Isles following the extinction of the bear and the wolf and is a protected species. Although badgers are categorised as carnivore, they are in fact omnivores and eat a wide range of plants and animals. The badger is a forager rather than a hunter and as such are opportunists when it comes to diet. They'll take whatever's available.

These nocturnal animals live in setts, a network of interconnected underground tunnels and chambers. Each social group can number up to around 15 badgers and is headed by a dominant male and female. Setts are typically excavated in sandy or chalky soil and, apart from the main sett, most groups have one or more additional setts.

It is thought that our badgers live in the very longstanding sett in the grounds of the old Winton School, now the Ismaili Centre. This is on Addiscombe Road opposite the Sandilands Tramstop.

Badgers are always on the lookout for both feeding opportunities and suitable sites and they can travel quite long distances. Badgers do eat domestic food scraps if they get the chance. We suspect that the introduction of
