I am sure we have all heard the bell ringing at St Mary Magdalene, Canning Road. The church was built in 1868 but at the time there were not sufficient funds to build the planned exceedingly tall spire. Sixty years later after much fundraising the current tower was completed in 1929. The tower was dedicated in January 1930 along with the 10 tonne bell which was named Gabriel. The dedication service was shown in cinemas all over the country. Every day at noon Gabriel was rung to call parishioners to prayer. This continued until World War II when the pealing of bells was prohibited except as a warning of invasion. In 1953 the tower and bell were shown to have cracks so Gabriel was recast as a smaller replica.

Have the wheels fallen off? East Croydon Gateway Update

At their invitation back in September, three of us from the committee met with the proposed 12,500 seat arena developer, Arrowcroft. We had the opportunity to ask questions firsthand that had been bothering us like, how is a pulse of 12,500 people going to get there for an event, let alone where they'll go to afterwards? Remember this is right by the side of East Croydon Station. We regret we did not receive any convincing answer. As for traffic flow and parking – which could impact really badly on our area - Arrowcroft say this is a matter for the Council.

It transpires that it's not just our residents association but others too. At the end of September we organised a meeting between five residents associations: us, H.O.M.E. (Elgin to Outram Roads), Whitgift Estate, Park Hill and Morland Park Estate. The Croydon Society was also involved. It transpires that we all wanted to ask the same question of the Council about how people get there and back after an event and the impact it will have upon where we live. We therefore wrote a joint open letter to the Leader of Croydon Council, Mike Fisher, requesting this information. Astonishingly, two months later, we are still awaiting any information on transport. Since easy, comfortable and affordable transport to such a large entertainment venue is imperative for its success, then we continue to question its commercial viability.

In the meanwhile the freehold owners of the Gateway site, Stanhope Schroder, intend to start work on their alternative park, office and Warehouse Theatre scheme very early next year. At least they have planning permission, which Arrowcroft currently does not.

We have just learnt that Croydon Council has begun a Compulsory Purchase Order for the whole of the Gateway site in an endeavour to facilitate the arena development. If you would like to add your

A Local Success Story St Mary Magdalene – our parish church Not just for Christmas!

We have watched as more and more people come and go from St Mary Magdalene and wanted to know why it is so successful. *Lesley Kavanagh* interviewed Reverend Richard Williams to find out. Here's what she reports.

Our parish church in Canning Road is much more than just a place of worship. Admittedly the Reverend Richard Williams will welcome up to 1,000 local residents at Christmas services, but his wider vision is that of a church at the hub of a socially and racially diverse neighbourhood, a church which reaches out to all local people regardless of colour or creed.

A pastoral team of eight at St Mary's are concerned with the needs of the bereaved, the lonely, the deprived and the socially excluded. There is work done among refugees and asylum seekers, and a support group for those suffering from depressive illnesses. The young and the old of the parish are a high priority. There are projects such as the 'Kick London' football scheme and holiday activity clubs for local youngsters. Strong links have been forged with nearby schools such as Davidson and Oval at primary level and Tennison's and Stanley Tech at secondary level. At Barrington Lodge and Colby Court homes for the elderly, St Mary's plays both a religious and pastoral role.

It has been estimated that 70% of voluntary social work in Croydon is carried out by the churches.

Where would Addiscombe be without it's parish church?

The Magdalene Centre is host to a thriving Pre-School and is used regularly by Brownies and Rainbows. Other activities which go on are the Mother and Toddler Club, Keep Fit, a 'French for Kids' club, a badminton group and the 'Melody Makers' singing club. There are occasional concerts in the centre or in the church, such as local pianist David Dreebin or the Croydon Male Voice Choir, and photographic and painting exhibitions have been held over the years.

Looking into the future, the expansion of the Magdalene Centre and the facilities offered is definitely on the cards, either through redevelopment of the existing site or by forming a partnership with a neighbouring church, such as the Methodists on the Lower Addiscombe Road. Richard Williams has big ideas for St Mary's and believes that community outreach is a way for Christians to show their love for those around them, whether they be potential church-goers or simply fellow human beings.

Reuse Materials

Most of the materials we use at Christmas can be used again. Wrapping paper, cards, decorations and Christmas trees all have more than one life so be creative! Here are some tips:

Make your own unique decorations from cards and scrap materials and make gift tags from old greetings cards.

~ Tie presents with ribbon, string or brightly coloured wool rather than sticky tape so that wrapping paper can be re-used over and over again.
