The Big Renovation St Mary Magdalene church tower Thursday 9 July, 8.00 pm, in the Crypt

Rev Richard Williams has already told us about the plans to restore and develop the church tower at our AGM and in our 1 November 2008 newsletter. The main difference is that the wooden doors, which will be preserved inside, will be replaced by glass doors that enable people to see inside the magnificent church. The entrance will be made into a quiet area open to the community to reflect or pray. The church tower is being cleaned with scaffolding up between 22 June and Christmas.

Richard is holding a meeting for residents in our two roads on Thursday 9 July, 8.00 pm, in the Crypt (entrance at the front of the church). He would like to tell residents more of the plans and seek our opinions.

The Big Squeeze - Overcrowding on trams

Some of our residents have commented on the overcrowding of trams during peak hours. Trams are now the responsibility of Transport for London so we raised this with our GLA Member, Steve O'Connell, who asked our views on campaigning for more trams.

We discussed this suggestion at our AGM and have made the following observations to our GLAM. We have requested an improved tram service. We realise there is no simple solution to achieve this. How it is best achieved we feel is best left to the service providers to investigate rather than just requesting more trams. We are aware that improvements to the tram service may involve a combination of measures. We would ask Transport for London to investigate carefully the various possibilities and the knock-on effects of each.

These are some of the ideas which have been suggested:

* Increasing the length of trams - although of course there would be major implications in having to change the length of all platforms;

* Increasing the frequency of trams - what effect would this have on other road users eg longer waiting times at junctions?

* Adjusting the signalling - again, what effect would this have on other road users?

We would not want improvements to the tram service to be at the expense of bus services which are largely good.

We acknowledge that demand for various types of transport often increases to fill available capacity.

If you have any further comments, do please let us, Steve O'Connell and our three Councillors, Andrew Price, Maria Garcia and Russell Jackson know.

The Big Conservation Area Question What can and what can we not do?

Croydon Council's much worked Conservation Officer has been very helpful. He plans to liaise with us over an Area Assessment leading to a Management Plan some time this year. In the meantime he has told us the following.

Houses

'If you live in a house ('single dwelling house' in planning speak), you only need permission for the following:

· Demolition of a building more than 115 cubic metres in volume

 \cdot Demolition of a wall over 1m high.

• Erection of an outbuilding more than 20 square metres in area to the rear, or any building to the front of the house or between the house and the side boundary.

· Installation of a satellite dish on a prominent part of the house or roof.

• Everything else comes under permitted development rights – including changing windows i.e. no permission required'.

From experience this year, if you seek the Council's advice over windows in houses, they will play safe and give you the standard conservation area guidance that you should use the same materials as the original (i.e. wood for many of us). In practice, however, when someone questioned the use of UPVC replacement windows in a different style at 53 Clyde Road, the response from our Conservation Officer was '*No permission is required to change windows within a conservation area, and all we can do is encourage people to choose sympathetic replacements. We are able to specify the type of new windows for new developments and extensions that require planning permission.*'

Flats

For flats, Croydon Council's Technical Support Manager tells us 'Basically any external alterations to flats in conservation areas (including replacement windows) requires planning permission. Internal alterations do not require planning permission but may need building regulations'. The reason for needing planning permission for changing windows in flats is to ensure that people do something sympathetic with the rest of the same building.

Trees

If you live in a house or a flat, you must inform the Council if you are planning 'to fell or heavily prune any tree with a trunk over 75mm.'

There will be no alcohol sold at the fair.
